We Couldn't Do It Without Our Staff

As the Marina Manager, **Marc Pettigrew** oversees marina operations for LMS. You will find him down on the docks or in the Welcome Centre, answering the phone, greeting visiting boaters, and organizing rendezvous with various clubs.

A big part of Marc's work is planning, contracting and supervising the off-season work program for the LMS docks, Welcome Centre and boathouses.

Friendly and approachable, Marc is one of the reasons LMS has such a wonderful reputation amongst members and visitors. Along with Pam, his wife of 31 years, Marc lives at the marina on *TOBA*, a 42' power boat. Not only does Marc have one of the prettiest offices from which to work with harbour views from every window, but his life at the marina as a 'liveaboard' is less complicated compared to the management of home and property as in the past.

As a child, Marc grew up in Deep Cove (southern Vancouver Island) and in the summer of his 12th year began work at the local marina. In fact, Marc has worked in the marine industry all his life. At another marina in North Saanich he worked for 10 years mainly hauling boats. Later Marc was employed at a metal fabrication shop where for 18 years he worked on projects such as weather buoys and rigid zodiak hulls. At this point Marc started his own company manufacturing shock mitigating seating for small fast boats. The US Coast Guard and the US Navy (along with other companies) contracted him to upgrade their vessels. Seven years later Marc sold his company and after taking a year off, came to work for LMS.

During the first year Marc and Pam lived in Shawnigan Lake and Marc commuted to Ladysmith. They had always loved boating, coming from a sailing and racing background. However, getting a spacious liveaboard sailboat was not in the cards and *TOBA* fit the bill. In the summer you will see them out boating most weekends as they love to be on the water. Marc misses sailing and was an accomplished racer on the Pacific coast. He won the OLSON 30' Western Championship in Seattle and has fond memories of racing with family and crew.

Marc and Pam have two kids and two grandkids, all living in North Saanich close to where Marc grew up. A highlight for Marc of working at LMS over the past 5 years or so is meeting new friends as well as the many visitors to the marina. He cites the marina as a sort of "happy place" where people come in a good mood, often on holidays or getting ready to go off in their boat, smiling and enthused and eager for an adventure.

Meet our Volunteers Keith Gillanders

Quiet, friendly, and competent are words that describe **Keith Gillanders**. If you get the chance to talk with him for a few minutes don't pass it up!

Keith is one of those exceptionally talented volunteers to whom we are all indebted when we enjoy the Welcome Centre, access ramp and new docks, and many other features of our Community Marina. It was to Keith that LMS turned when we needed a Project Leader for the 2010-2012 upgrade that transformed our marina into the facility that is known as one of the top 10 marinas in the Pacific NW.

To quote Keith, "I received an innocent invitation to lunch from people I knew at LMS. They were looking for someone to help 'one or two days a week' with a marina renovation project. HA! It turned out to be 3 to 5 days a week over several years while we scoped, bid, and oversaw the marina upgrade and new Welcome Centre construction. It was a fascinating project and working with the LMS people is a real pleasure. I still try to help out when Rod or Marc need help on a dock extension and the more recent heat tracing work."

The Welcome Centre being a floating structure and not always perfectly level while under construction, it didn't take Keith long to realize that carpenter levels should be banned from the site and replaced with the trusty 3-4-5 triangle.

Born in Saskatchewan, Keith's roots are on the Prairies. A Chemical Engineering degree in Edmonton was followed by a 33-year career in the oil industry. After years as a project engineer in Calgary and Fort St. John, Keith spent almost 4 years in Norway involved in North Sea oil and gas production.

Along the way Keith married Rosemary – a lovely lassie from Greenock, Scotland (who also happens to be a rare expert in the complex and arcane world of natural gas accounting). Keith and Rosemary retired to a property on Boat Harbour in 2008.

Keith is so self-effacing that, while you might guess that he is an avid kayaker and an avid runner (both true) you might not guess that he is also a bit car crazy. For 20 years he raced cars in an open wheel road racing series called Formula Ford and for a time taught high performance driving. He thinks he might now be ready for an electric car...

A Voice From The Community Staff Sgt. Ken Brissard

Spending time with **RCMP Staff Sgt. Ken Brissard** is a delight. When asked about hobbies or interests he replies, "I love people". And it shows. Ken believes that two key ingredients to a successful career with the RCMP are the ability to follow through—finish what you start, and an innate love of people.

Ken also speaks lovingly of his family—his wife, 4 kids, 3 grandchildren and another on the way. Two daughters are in the RCMP, the third works in Victoria and his son works in an addiction center. They are educated, travelled, and well launched in their chosen careers. The Island is home and this is where Ken plans to retire, farming on their property. His dad was a farmer and so was his Grandfather. His dad joined the Canadian Army during the war. Wounded in Dieppe he was shipped to Scotland to recover. There he met a Scottish nurse who gave the best sponge baths, so he just had to marry her.

Ken has had a rich and varied career during his 28 years of service with the RCMP. Ken arrived as the Ladysmith Detachment Commander late in October 2015 and settled back into the area where he grew up. Keeping the citizens safe is his number one priority. One of the reasons he was keen to accept the posting here, is because of the detachment's connection to West Coast Marine Services and the response vessel that is moored at the LMS Community Marina. You will often find him down on the wharf or enjoying a chat with the locals at the Welcome Centre. He can't wait for the Oyster Bay Café to begin its' summer hours; he likes to go there for coffee 2-3 times a week.

Much of Ken's work is proactive, here and on Thetis and Penelakut Islands. He speaks about the importance of 'officer presence' — what he calls 'flying the flag'. The detachment also works to keep our waterways safe doing preventative boat checks, inspecting for standards of safety equipment, monitoring for illegal trafficking, and education around the dangers of drugs and alcohol. Ken's message to the boating community is to always "think safety and know your limitations".

How does Ken reduce stress and maintain balance in his life? "Hay farming is therapy" he tells me. Also having a healthy attitude about what is possible and what one can control or change helps keep things in perspective. Ken encourages his staff and young officers to "Just do the best you can—you can't change every bad behaviour."

Ken has earned the appreciation and respect of this community. He not only provides 'officer presence', but quality presence. So, say hello to Ken when you see him—he is a genuinely nice guy. And he enjoys telling funny stories – just ask him about the paint on the old boat!

Also, on February 24 the Welcome Centre saw the first **Talk-on-the Dock** event of the year. Catherine Dook spoke about her and her husband's experiences "Anchoring in the Gulf Islands". The event was a great success, and over 40 people crowded into the main floor of the Welcome Centre to listen to Catherine.




Talk On The Dock with Catherine Dook



On March 12 it was an honour to welcome **federal Minister of Transport the Honourable Marc Garneau** to the LMS docks. He was here to announce important new funding for the removal and disposal of abandoned boats and wrecks from B.C. coastal communities, including

nine from the Ladysmith waterfront. His presence in the Community Marina was a testament to the contributions of our community leaders, including LMS Executive Director Rod Smith, in bringing the issues of derelict and abandoned vessels to national attention. A week later Saltair Marine Services started the work by dismantling and removing the large wreck that had sat on the shore on Slack Point for the past several years.
